

## The Benefits of Regulated First Aid Qualifications

## What is a regulated first aid qualification?

Regulated first aid qualifications are listed on the National Qualification Framework for their respective country and regulated by <u>Ofqual</u>, <u>Qualifications Wales</u>, <u>SQA</u>, or <u>CCEA</u>.

**BEWARE**: some industry organisations claim to offer "nationally regulated first aid training qualifications" and to "regulate training providers". These are **NOT** government regulated qualifications.

## How can I check if a first aid qualification is regulated?

A list of Awarding Organisations (AOs) that accredit government regulated first aid qualifications can be found <u>here</u>. Certificates issued by these AOs contain the Ofqual, Qualifications Wales, SQA and/or CCEA logos.

## Why choose regulated first aid qualifications?

Regulated qualifications have robust Quality Assurance processes in design, delivery and award of the qualification. The following table outlines just a few of the differences:

The Awarding organisation is regulated by an independent government regulator and must comply with stringent conditions of recognition.	~	_
Certificates are issued centrally by the Awarding Organisation.	$\checkmark$	-

Assessments are centrally devised, implemented and reviewed in compliance with the government regulators conditions of recognition.	~	-

External quality assurance is based on a system of just one visit every <b>5 years</b> , irrespective of risk, size of training provider or number of learners.	_	$\checkmark$
Blended learning complies with the First Aid Quality Partnership <u>Blended Learning in</u> <u>First Aid Quality Assurance Standards</u> – an initial First Aid at Work (FAW) qualification must have <b>12 hours</b> of face-to-face learning / assessment.	~	-
Blended initial FAW training is permitted with just <b>6 hours</b> face-to-face learning/ assessment.	-	$\checkmark$
Full paediatric first aid qualifications must be delivered over <b>12 hours</b> in line with <u>EYFS</u> standards.	~	-
In Scotland, full paediatric first aid qualifications can be delivered in just 6 hours.	_	$\checkmark$
Awarding Organisations must inform all other Awarding Organisations if a trainer, assessor or centre is found to have committed malpractice – to prevent 'AO hopping'.	~	-
