Part 2

Now, we are going to start part 2, which is a conversation. Weather and climate can have both a negative and positive impact on people, in many different ways. Talk together about this. Here are some ideas you can talk about. (please share the visual prompts for Part 2 and allow the candidates a few seconds to look at the pictures) Can you both see the picture? (wait for confirmation from both candidates)

You have a few seconds to look at the pictures first, and then you will need to have a conversation for about 5 minutes.

OK, please start. Talk together about the negative and positive impacts of the weather and climate on people. (Candidates should speak together for about 5 minutes – if they don't, use additional questions provided below to prompt them to say more)

Thank you. This is the end of the exam.

SWITCH OFF THE AUDIO RECORDER.

ADDITIONAL GUIDANCE IN PART 2

- Make sure that both candidates receive equal opportunity to speak.
- The candidates should talk together rather than present two individual long responses. You can remind them by saying: Please remember this is a conversation you need to talk together.
- It's OK if the conversation between the two candidates moves slightly away from the topic specified by the task as long as it is still linked to the main question.
- Keep your own input to the minimum. Only intervene in the above situations, or if the candidates run out of things to say significantly before the end of the time limit.

ADDITIONAL ELICITATION QUESTIONS IN **PART 2** (use some of the questions if the candidates don't speak for the expected amount of time):

What else do you think? / There is more time for you to talk – please continue. / It was interesting what you said about (*insert something candidates mentioned earlier*) – please tell me more about that. What about (*insert the description of one of the images provided*)?
